Why do we focus on literacy? Studies show that in Los Angeles, two -thirds of students not reading proficiently by the end of fourth grade will at some point be incarcerated or on welfare. More than 50% of students in LA are not meeting reading standards and the number is even more alarming for students of color. In order to

At J3 Foundation we are working each and every day to make a difference in the reading lives of young people.

The many dreams and aspirations of students will emerge in the early years with proficient reading and a love of reading. J3 Foundation is working to support growth in the reading skills, habits, confidence, and book access for the most vulnerable 4<sup>th</sup> grade students across Los Angeles.

When Jamie, Jessica and I established the Cozy Reading Club, we set out with an initial goal to serve 1,000 students within a ten-year period. However, the impact of Covid-19 on students and the racial inequity that many are facing have inspired us to reach as many students as possible as quickly as we can. This year, we expanded our reach to 12 new schools in Compton Unified School District, all while adapting our program to fit the virtual classroom model. During this critical time for learners, our team found new ways of teaching, connecting with, and supporting students.

# **OUR IMPACT**

During the 2021-2022 school year, **70% of students** in J3's afterschool reading programs saw improvements in their standardized test scores.

By District:

Compton Unified School District – **65% of students saw improvements** in their standardized test scores over the course of their participation in J3.

Glendale Unified School District – **84% of students saw improvements** in their standardized test scores over the course of their participation in J3.

Los Angeles Unified School District – **75% of students saw improvements** in their standardized test scores over the course of their participation in J3.

Surveys conducted anonymously have shown that across all schools and districts:

**100%** of parents felt that J3 positively impacted their student's reading skills, habits, and confidence.

**90%** of students said they read more during their enrollment in J3 than they would have otherwise.

**91%** of students said that J3 made them feel more confident in themselves and their reading abilities.

**91%** of students said that through J3 they were able to access more books than they did previously.

100% of students said that J3's library featured books that they were excited to read.

Additionally, this year alone, J3 Foundation donated over **1,500 books** directly to students!

## **OUR APPROACH**

Our J3 approach is grounded in rigorous, evidencebased research and informed by a cycle of continuous evaluation. Our development team includes nationally recognized experts who are educational practitioners, nationally recognized researchers, and experts in the fields of psychology and social work. Our advisory board includes educational practitioners and researchers, parents, authors, entrepreneurs, and professionals in several fields. Our J3 after-school reading program for students in grade 4 provides the skills, habits, confidence, and books kids need to succeed. Our evidence- based curriculum and highly-qualified teachers provide young scholars with the opportunity to practice word-attack skills, increase their vocabulary, and build their reading fluency. At J3, we teach young scholars how to use their voices, to speak up, to read out loud and to be public scholars in community spaces.



J3 is on a mission to create lifelong readers, and that starts with access to irresistible books from our culturally relevant collections. Our J3 classroom libraries and home collections have been carefully chosen and include high-interest, culturally relevant, fiction and non-fiction titles to encourage wide reading. In close partnership with local donors, we provide free and low-cost books so young scholars can choose books to grow their own collections. J3 partners with schools and their teachers who play an active role in giving our young scholars new reasons and opportunities for reading all day long. Our school partners help young scholars apply their growing skills and newfound confidence with multiple opportunities for co-reading and partner reading with classmates, home reading activities, and community reading events. These essential partnerships help J3 scholars learn how to share their confidence and new habits with siblings, parents, and friends in the community.


